JRHS SETS COURSE TO FLOURISH

John Wooden, the decorated UCLA Men's basketball coach from 1948-1975, created the now famous "Pyramid of Success". One of his many famous quips about performance transcends time and function: "Success is peace of mind attained only through self-satisfaction in knowing you made the effort to do the best of which you were capable."

This year, JRHS is taking on some Bruin-like growth through the ACSI "Flourishing School Culture Model". ACSI has done an extensive study to define what a Flourishing School looks like. The model was rolled out in the summer of 2021, and JRHS signed on to be in the second cohort, during this academic year. The model defines Five Do-



mains of Flourishing, and then 35 Constructs that support the Domains.

The first step in the process was a comprehensive survey of constituents, including parents, students, alumni, faculty and more. From this, JRHS was presented with an overview of the findings, compared to the national data. Then, Headmaster Philbrick went to the training Institute to learn how to best interpret the data and begin to put together growth initiatives that will move the needle for JRHS ever more in the "Flourishing" direction.

We can celebrate high marks in constructs such as "Holistic Teaching" which shows how JRHS effectively teaches the mind, heart, and hands to greater work, and "Spiritual Formation" which states how our Alumni report that their Christian faith is stronger thanks to attending JRHS. Areas where there is opportunity for growth include "Data-driven Improvement" which challenges us to centralize our efforts with data towards stronger Outcomes, and "Resource Planning" which directs our leaders towards ever improving our stewardship of God's resources.

On a cool early November evening, the Granite State Christian Schools Association held its annual Awards Banquet. Each year, Christian schools from all over the state gather to celebrate, and to honor teachers, administrators and school leaders with various awards.



SMYTH MEMORIAL BUILDING READY FOR THE NEXT 90 YEARS!

Ninety years ago, the Town of Candia received a generous gift from the wife of the late governor Frederick Smyth, to establish a library. During the summer of 2021, this legacy town building went through a major renovation, led by Jesse Remington High School.

The renovation was accomplished in record time, illustrating how big goals can be accomplished when we all work together in a common direction. Local contractors were called



upon to prioritize this work in the summer of 2021, with the stated goal of completion by Labor Day. The hard working and generous contractors included Severino Trucking, Patriot HVAC, Pioneer Electric, Ed's Flooring America, Smith Pump among others.

Groundbreaking was June 14, and final town approvals came on August 26 - 74 days in total! In those comparatively few days, much was accomplished. A new well and septic; all the interior plumbing and wiring; installation of a kitchenette, bathroom and work counter; new HVAC including air conditioning, new or renewed floors; fire alarm system; internet; some new paint - all this and more in just over two months! Dozens of generous donors stepped forth, raising the funds necessary for the goal - \$150,000.

This new space provides another inspiring place for JRHS students to learn and grow. Originally designed as a library, it boasts elegant high ceilings, fine woodwork done by master craftsman, and ample windows on all sides providing natural light. In total, it provides JRHS with two great classrooms, a break room, and small group meeting room. We are excited to consider the future for JRHS, as this expansion has developed the east or Church side of campus to now include three buildings. We look forward to a full enrollment which will more fully utilize our newly expanded campus.

CHAPEL & WORSHIP

The Helmet of the Sentinel has been the centerpiece of the current logo, and we have brought it into the new one as well. We take the helmet from the story of the Roman Centurion, from Matthew 8. The soldier from scripture clearly understood authority and had great faith in Jesus' ability to heal his servant. The words of Jesus have been artistically represented in the stained glass of the west window in our Sentinel Building "Go, and it will be done just as you have believed". And it also makes us think of Paul's letter to the Ephesians, "the full armor of God". The helmet is a symbol of salvation, the starting point of our lives with Christ, that allows us to join in God's work.



The image of the book is new. As a Christian school, it of course points us to the Bible, the most important source for growing in wisdom, knowledge and understanding. It also commemorates that JRHS is a place of academic learning, and therefore symbolizes the robust program of study our students are offered. The bookmark makes us realize that JRHS is both spiritual and academic learning, the integration of faith and learning
